


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Soon the winter guests will be arriving; but, in the meantime, we have been enjoying a little bit of a break with only 12 calls for the month of October:

- 4 public assists
- 3 medical calls
- 2 lost persons
- 1 vehicle accident
- 1 assault
- 1 fish hook in the arm



This lull gives us some time to take our beach vehicles out of service so that we can tend to rust problems, annual servicing, and tune-ups. We recently ordered a new beach trailer to replace an older one that hauls our jet ski to and from the beach.

During 2018, we added 10 new members to the Department. We started the year with 17 firefighters, and we now have 27. With all the new members, we have been conducting basic training at our meetings, so that our firefighters are educated and can stay safe when they respond to the variety of calls we experience each day.

HOW YOU SHOULD PARTICIPATE IN THE PLANNING AND ZONING PROCESS

When a request for re-zoning or variance is received from the Baldwin County Planning and Zoning Department by our Fort Morgan Planning and Zoning advisory Committee, the application packet is posted on our website and will be considered by our committee at a meeting on the next third Wednesday at 9:00 AM in the Fellowship Hall of Shell Bank Baptist Church. As space is available, notice will be posted on the VFD sign at Station #1 as "P & Z" with the date. It is the responsibility of our members to go to our website to see if this is an item of concern for them. A sign will also be posted on the property with the number of the request. Anyone may come to our committee meeting, but only the members vote on a recommendation.

The public notice contains information about the meeting of the County Planning and Zoning Commission where the request will be voted upon. Bonnie Lowery is our District 25 representative on this committee. She reported that at the November meeting two re-zoning requests, for which we recommended denial, were approved despite her explanation of the reasons for our requests of denial. In such cases we need locals to attend the meeting and before the meeting opens, register to speak.

If a request is approved by this committee, it then goes before the County Commission, where there is another opportunity for the public to voice its opinion. In our fight to control development, we need people who are willing to go to these meetings and, before the meeting starts, register to speak. This means that you have to be in Bay Minette before 8:00 AM. Schedule of County Commission meetings can be found on the county website www.baldwincountyal.gov.

**Fort Morgan History
Alabama Gulf Coast 1933-1939**

We will continue to explore the history of the CCC, WPA, and paving of the Fort Morgan Road through newspaper articles which Heather Tassin, Fort Morgan director, and Jeanette Bornhold, Foley Library, have so graciously provided. The following is from The Montgomery Advertiser, November 4, 1934

BATTLEMENTS OF FORT MORGAN NOW HAVEN FOR HOMELESS WANDERERS

FORT MORGAN, ALA., Nov. 3-(AP)

The battlements of old Fort Morgan on Mobile Bay took part in much of her country's four major wars and today in a fifth, the bitter "War on Depression." Fort Morgan again is playing an important part.

On this wind-swept point projecting from the eastern shore at the foot of Mobile Bay, the transient division of FERA has established a haven for the homeless and jobless wanderers of the nation. Each day the launch "Painter" clear from the Mobile City wharf loaded with men and supplies for Fort Morgan where a staff of officers and 400 transients are preparing barracks for the cold days ahead this Winter.

Since most of the houses were constructed during the Spanish-American War period, nearly all are in need of extensive repair. As material necessities are taken care of, camp directors are working out an educational and recreational program designed to send the transients back into the world better prepared to make their own way. Foremen are instructing groups in the principles of poultry and hog raising, boat building, carpentering and woodworking.

In addition to swimming and fishing, men of the camp are going in for a well-rounded recreation program of basketball, football and volleyball.

Separate nights are set aside for camp singing, and for "fight night" featuring amateur boxing. The younger boys are concentrating at one end of the camp to be given special advantages in education and recreation.

The temporary residents of Fort Morgan are also beginning a program of beautification on the old fort itself, in addition to making the entire site a livable and wholesome community. While little remains of the original fortification of 1814, the section of the fort which played a historic part in the Battle of Mobile Bay stands today practically as it was back in 1864.

Major B. R. Patton, camp director, plans to clear the old fort of its overgrowth of weeds, remove debris, and plant shrubs and flowers in a landscape program.

Although Fort Morgan is accessible only by water, it is hoped that the construction of a road will enable Alabamians to visit by automobile one of their State's most important historic sites.

Fort Morgan History ~ Indian Canal.....Harry King

We recently dug a cross section of the Canal and recorded the strata shown of seditation depth and width of waterway open for navigation 12' to 15.'


We gave a Canal Presentation at Gulf Shores Cultural Center on our work and findings. About 180 people from the community attended. We also presented same to the South East Archaeological Conference in Augusta, Georgia, with 800 archaeologists attending. I will give an update at the Visitor Information Center In Gulf Shores on February 13.

To the west of the Canal there are numerous mounds, and the Bay shoreline is awash in Woodland pottery. There was a sizable population living there to help dig the Canal.

There are two conical mounds north of the Canal terminus into the Lagoon. One we test dug; the other is across the road in the foundation of the Henrietta Fulford house. Maybe this will be "the rest of the story" next time?

Dennis Hatfield was the first person to allow me on his and the Fulford property. His mother is the daughter of Henrietta Fulford and lives on Norman Lane.

Amid the glories of early Fall in Gulf Coast Alabama, I can now include first-hand enjoyment of Monarch butterflies, never having seen them before. In my back yard, I've planted many flowering shrubs for both my enjoyment of the flowers and for the benefit of butterflies, bees, and birds.

Among the plantings were two milkweeds with bright yellow-gold flowers, chosen because they are known to attract Monarchs and are a host plant for their eggs. I thought I spotted Monarchs in early October—which I thought was their normal timeframe for migrating through our area. But when I checked with Chan on the identity of the gold butterflies visiting my caryopteris bush, she said it might be a Gulf Fritillary. She described the difference: the Fritillary is faster in flight and a bit smaller than the Monarch. I kept watching but wasn't certain.

Then, beginning in late October (the 28th to be exact), the Monarchs began arriving every day by twos, threes, fours and fives—they spent hours feeding on the milkweed. What a joy!

The visitation was still going on—November 28th—and slowed only after our recent two-night light freeze. I don't know if they are part of the seasonal migration to the Mexican mountains or if we have a local community that over-winters here because of our climate. I keep enjoying...

U. S. Fish & Wildlife.....Christmas Trees for Sand Dunes

Landowners interested in receiving free Christmas trees for their beachfront properties can do so by emailing U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist Bill Lynn, at william_lynn@fws.gov. In the e-mail, please include the address of the property and the landowner's preferred contact information (phone number or e-mail). We will deliver the Christmas trees in January, and a minimum of three trees will be placed on the property. They will be arranged in a design known to catch sand, and form dunes over time. Trees are limited, so the effort will continue until the trees run out. This offer is open to any private landowner.

From the By-laws Adopted April 11, 2005

ARTICLE III – MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1 Regular (voting) Membership in this association shall be open only to property owners and/or residents in the unincorporated area west of mile 14.7 of the Fort Morgan peninsula.
- Section 2 Associate (non-voting) Membership shall be open to residents of areas outside the Fort Morgan Peninsula whose interests coincide with those of the Association including the preservation of the environment and quality of life of the Fort Morgan peninsula.
- Section 3 Membership application shall be made by completion of a form provided by the Association and payment of the required dues. Dues for the following year shall be determined at the October general meeting and shall be for the following calendar year January 1st through December 31st.
- Section 4 Payment of Regular (voting) Membership dues entitles a member household to one (1) vote. A member household is comprised of Association members living at one physical address. Past year member households paying dues after January 31st and new members joining the Association will have no voting rights until thirty (30) days after payment of dues.
- Section 5 Payment of Associate (non-voting) Membership dues entitles the member to attend all member meetings and receive the monthly newsletter.
